

- Student should be HAPPY to attend any school on the list


Considerations:



Decision Plans

Early Decision	Binding if admitted
Early Action	Receive a decision early. EA deadlines typically 11/1 or 11/15
Regular Decision	Deadlines will vary. Response usually received in Spring.
Rolling Decision	Applications are read and decisions are made continuously throughout the year. Pay attention to scholarship deadlines.



LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

- Required by some schools
 - Teacher Recommendation
 - Counselor Recommendation
- Letter of Recommendation Form can be downloaded from our counseling site.
- *Ask early! (3-4 weeks)

SAT/ACT

Test Optional/Flexible/Blind policies

- 17,000 Colleges Nationwide are now test optional
- All Washington State public and private colleges are test optional or test blind

Transcripts

- Check school's admission website for transcript requirements
- Common application transcripts are automatically submitted by Counselors if invited
- Some schools require you to mail a transcript.
- Some schools do not require a transcript until after admitted and enrolled (UW, University of California schools)


Graduation Requirements

High School and Beyond Plan

Provides students with the opportunity to explore their own skills and interests and discover potential career and educational options

- WA state Graduation requirement
- Completed in Xello
- Login through Office 365 to Xello app
- Students must complete ALL Core Lessons for 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade



Types of Financial Aid



Need-based aid that does not need to be repaid

- .
- \circ $\;$ Examples include the Federal Pell Grant and the WA Grant $\;$

2. Scholarships

- o Merit-based or need-based aid that does not need to be repaid
- o Awarded for academic achievement, community service, or other talent

3. Work-Study Programs

- o Provides part-time jobs for students with financial need
- o Allows students to earn money to help pay for education expenses

4. Loans

- o Borrowed money that must be repaid with interest
- o Includes federal loans like Direct Subsidized and Unsubsidized Loans, and Parent PLUS Loans

5. Institutional Aid

- Financial aid provided by colleges and universities
- o Can include grants, scholarships, and work-study opportunities specific to the institution

6. Private Scholarships and Loans

- o Offered by private organizations, companies, and banks
- Scholarships do not need to be repaid, while private loans do


